Mr. Terrel worked for big cattlemen here in early days, and was connected as a witness with the court trial over the lease or sub-lease of Indian grass land. This case was in court for five years or more, until all parties on the defense were "broke." Mr. Terrel is rather old and although this is valuable information, he is opposed to telling it for fear of in some way casting some reflection on the descendants of the parties connected with the case. He says that there are only two of the entire bunch (defense) connected with this case still living.

His wife lived in "Old Greer County" under five forms of government. Greer County was claimed by the State of Texas and by Oklahoma Territory, and there were two different counties, Greer County, Texas and Greer County, Oklahoma Territory and Oklahoma State.
