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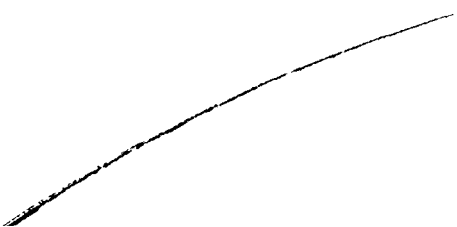

An Interview with Nancy Alberty, Westville.  
By - Jesse S. Bell, Investigator.  
May 6, 1938

I am one-eighth Cherokee and was born December 7, 1862, in Cherokee County, North Carolina. I was born of a prominent family, my grandfather being a large plantation owner.

My family came to the Cherokee Nation about 1870, settling at Caney Creek, southwest of Stilwell, Adair County, and later we moved to Going Snake District near Westville where I grew to womanhood and where I met my future husband to be, Mose Alberty, a quarter-blood Cherokee, son of Jack Alberty, a pioneer brother of Moses Alberty and Thomas B. Alberty.

My husband was a brother of Bluford Alberty, the first County Judge after Statehood, and a well known Cherokee attorney in Cherokee Tribal affairs.

My brother, John Holland, was also a District Judge at one time.
