Interview with John P. Brothers South Fourth Street Sayre, Oklahoma

Mr. Brothers came to Oklahoma Territory in 1890,
before the Run of April 19, 1892. He came through on
horseback. Fifteen were in one group. They drove 700
cattle through from Montague County, Texas, and eventually
settled in old Greer County at a place now Jester, Oklahoma.

Mr. Brothers worked on the old Bar Ranch nine years.

This is called Doxey, Oklahoma.

They had outlaws at that time. They didn't have any headquarters but just humgout on the creeks. The reason the outlaws started they had been beaten out of their money.

The old dugout where Redbuck, the chief outlaw, was killed was on Oak Creek. This was north of where Elk City new stands.

Mr. Brothers lived among the Shawnes Tribe. They lived in tepess made of poles with canvas covers. He furnished the Indians with meat from what they called range camps.
