Governor John F. Brown, Seminole,
By F. D. Brown, nephew, Henryetta,

Governor John F. Brown, my uncle, had a big store in Sasakwa, and he owned a part interest in his brother Jackson's store in Newoka, I think. He had a big ranch, and quite a lot of land and cattle, which were his personal property and didn't belong to the Seminole Nation. He had six or seven wives, but not at one time. Some people say they were sisters but they were not. He had children by each wife. He and his brother issued duebills, but I don't know how many. These could be spent only at their stores.
