I was born at Washita, Caddo County, February 3, 1912. My father was Walter Lone Wolf, son of the noted Chief Lone Wolf of the Kiowa Tribe. My mother was Mrs. Jesse Lone Wolf, also of the Kiowa Tribe. They were both born in the Kiowa Indian Territory where our people have lived since the Kiowa Tribe was brought from the Northern Territories.

When I grew up the Indian boys and girls had much better advantages in school and in living than those of the early days. The Government had provided schools and clothing and my parents had also enjoyed better living conditions than their parents had lived under.

My Grandfather Lone Wolf had professed Christianity before his death and had accepted the civilized way of living.

I attended High school at Hobart, Kiowa County, the public school, but I quit school in my Senior year.

I was married to Edna Cody, who was born near Carnegie, on April 3, 1914. Her father was Albert Cody and her mother was Mabel Gocmyri, both of Kiowa Indian Tribe. Two children were born to us in marriage, they are a boy and a girl. The boy's name is Bruce Walter Lone Wolf and the girl is named Gaynell Rodean Lone Wolf. My wife and I speak English to them but their grandmothers talk to them in their original Kiowa tongue and the children seem to understand and speak both languages with ease.

We live like other citizens and expect to educate our children just like other people, but we also expect to teach them the Kiowa language and the customs and history of our people.
