An Interview with Mr. William B. Fullerton,
Route #4, Anadarko, Oklahoma.

I came into the Territory in 1901. This was in Choctaw Nation. I first moved to the little place of Caddo and lived there some time. I later moved to the "Twelve Mile Prairie", located north and west of Durant. My business was riding. I worked on a horse ranch, breaking horses for riding and also for working purposes. My father was also a cattleman but was classed as a small one. We "ran" some three hundred head at one time. These my father and I tended ourselves. We did the branding and herding and also some farm work. My main occupation was working with either cattle or horses. I was only a boy and riding horses or punching cows was the only thing I could get a job at. I was born in Arkansas and moved to Texas as a baby and was raised in Texas. I stayed in Oklahoma for six years then moved back to Texas.

In 1911 I returned to Oklahoma and have resided in Caddo County since that time. My father was also a shoe cobbler and ran a shoe shop in Fort Cobb for several years.
