Interview: Charles F. Landrum  
South Bell St.  
Vinita, Okla.

My name is Charles F. Landrum. I was born on Duck Creek in Delaware District, on June 4, 1869. I was married on April 26, 1926 to Cora Woodall and have no children.

My father's name is Benjamin Franklin Landrum.

My mother's maiden name was Elizabeth Woodall. Her father's name was George Caruth Woodall. Her mother was named Ellen (Moore) Woodall.

My father's brothers and sisters were: Nannie, Elizabeth, Hiram, Charles, James, Rebecca, David Dixon, Jemima, John, Aaron, Dorcas and Rachael Landrum.

In my father's family there were nine children, namely: Dixon, Emma, Benjamin, Seth (Mouse), Cicero Martin (Bud), Louisa, Charles F., William A. and Ada Landrum.

Two of my uncles served on the Supreme court of the Cherokee Nation. John Landrum served one year, in 1877. He died March 7, 1880 and was buried in the Landrum Cemetery, seven miles southeast of Vinita, near the place he was living. The official location of the cemetery is, Section 2 and 11, T. 24, R 20 E., officially platted May 12, 1914 by George Ashby, county engineer and on record at the Craig County Court House.

David Dixon Landrum served on the supreme court for a two year term in 1881 and 1882.

Benjamin Seth (Mouse) Landrum, my brother, was elected to the National council in 1883 and served two years. He was elected sheriff of Delaware District in 1885 and served one two year term.

All of my uncles and aunts and all of my brothers and sisters are dead, except one sister, Mrs. Ada (Landrum) Williams, who resides at Bernice, Oklahoma in

Delaware County.

My brother Bud was the last to die. We lived on the old home place on Duck Creek settled by my father. We lived as bachelors for many years until his death. Then I married Cora Woodall, a widow with six children, and we now live in her property on South Bell St., Vinita, Oklahoma.
