I am sending you an Epitaph from an Indian tomb for your Grant Foreman Collection. I don't believe there's another one like it in the World nor a more true one.

An old Indian, Dr. J. H. Woodward, of Pettigrew, Arkansas, lived to be ninety odd years old. His wife, Polly, died several years before he did, so he had erected a Double Tomb with names, dates of births of both his wife and himself, etc. but he being still alive, a blank space for date of his death was left and just below were the words: "Hello, Polly, I have come to remain with you."
