"An Early-Day History".

I came from Hunt County, Texas, December 17, 1892, in covered wagons and driving oxen.

I have worked in a hardware store and also ran a tin shop. Then I moved to a farm, I walked and plowed, putting in a crop. We lived on corn bread and sometimes we would have a hog to butcher and make our meat and lard.

We had sorghum nolasses and after we made a batch of molasses, a group of people would come to our house and we would have an old-time candy pulling and dance, and what a time we had!

We used to make cider and let it set in kegs so that it would get so strong we could hardly drink it.

We have had the Indians steal barrels of our cider. They loved it.

We went to church for miles around, a large group going together. Our schools weren't very large. Our teachers had only a seventh or eighth grade education.

I have worked from sumup until sundown many days only getting from forty to fifty cents a day. I would go in from the field, milk several cows, and cut wood to do the folks all the next day.

I drove big oxen to this country and an old-time covered wagon. It makes me shiver to think back of what we had to eat, what hard times we went through, and what a lot, of hard work we did to help build up Oklahoma. I now am very old and am ready to go to another country. I am waiting for his coming.
