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"COLD YEAR'S COLLOW"

uld residents of the sections about Tablequan and .ark :ill often referred to Cold Teather ollow. The hollow or valley between tree covered ridges south of lark ill didnot derive its name from weather conditions but from an oldtime full-blood Cherokee whose home was established there in an early period. This individual seems to have been advanced in years at the time of the Civil War, for in speaking of him he was referred to as "old Coldweather". thether he lived until the end of the war, there is no one who can now relate. But it is known that Joldweather was one of the biomeers of the nill region south of the Eark Mill neighborhood and was living in the hollow at the time inportant developments were taking

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place in the Cherokee Lation. 'e was an adherent of the party of Chief John Moss, and probably was a veteran of the Cherokee regiment, which assisted Andrew Jackson in his contests with the hostile element of the Creeks in the war of Tolk. The trouble little Creeks occurred in 1.13-14, in which latter year they were defeated bergely through the cid of the Cherokees.

Joldweather built his nome in the isol ted hollow because he liked to live among the hills and timber and in vicinity of a spring of water and a stream. In the period when Joldweather lived in the hollow wild game as very abundant and he was successful in slaying deer and turkeys at no great distance from his log-walled domicile.
