AN OLD FULL BLOOD CHOCTAW INDIAN FAMILY CEMETERY

This old cemetery has long been forgotten. There are oak trees 3 or 4 inches through grown in the graves. The markers are all covered with moss. Some are broken.

There were two graves dug up. The bones left on top. The hole was left open and the marker to one was in the hole where the bones were left out of the grave. The old Indian woman who showed me the old Winston Burial Ground was wondering why it had been dug in. No one seems to know.

There were 5 in line with out markers, the middle one having been dug into. I would say it was 4 feet deep and left open. This was done late last summer, for what reason no one knew that I interviewed.

The nearest house was one mile from this old cemetery, which is five miles south of Forney, Oklahoma.

Betsy Bohanon-Roebuck, who showed me about in this cemetery, is a full-blood Choctaw, aged 62 years and has lived at Old Hickory Hill all of her 62 years.

W. H. Martin died March 6, 1934, age 74 yrs. W. H. Martin is a son of Hercules Martin who was a Cherokee interpreter in Washington, D. C.
