Gaddis school

Location 6 miles east and one mile south on Highway #22. One mile south Gaddis school house and across the road from a farm house.

At this place there are four graves on a hill, the graves are unmarked. I began inquiring about them. I found Mr. Gaddis who tells me at the time he settled there in early days, the whole country was in pasture, no roads or section lines. There was a sort of community and a schoolhouse called "Fairview"

His(Mr. Gaddis) wife's grandfather died and was buried on the hill. There were about three or four more buried there later, before it was abandoned.

The cemetery had no name nor was it a private cemetery.

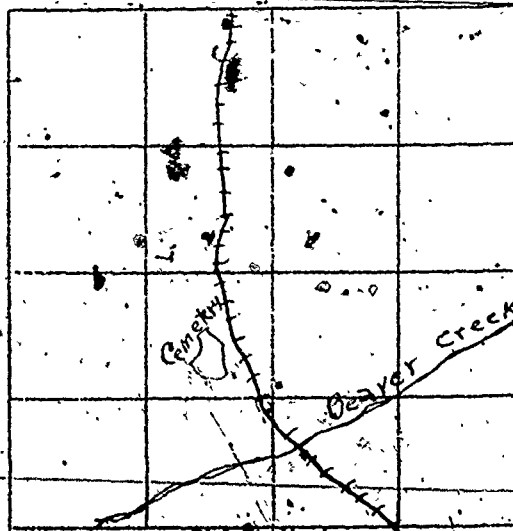
