"HISTORICAL MAP"

From an historical standpoint this map should be valuable. After many years of research on his part, it was prepared by Mr. S. A. Maroney, a brother to Mrs. J. W. Morris, in whose possession it is at this time. Mr. Maroney, for a number of years, was on the faculty of Phillips University, Enid. Later, and for a number of years prior to his death, Mr. Maroney was Professor of History at Oklahoma A. and M. College.

In graphic detail Mr. Maroney traced from their respective origins the migration of Indian tribes to Oklahoma. He completed the map in 1918. As a supplemental source of Indian History it should be valuable, since it depicts in graphic style information concerning the migration of Indians to Oklahoma that could not be given in multiplied thousands of words. The map is well drafted and printed and shows much work and research on the part of Mr. Maroney.
