Located one and one half miles east and one half mile north of Eufaula, Oklahoma.

The family plat has a sand rock wall around it, about four (4) feet high, 18 to 24 inches thick, and is about 18 by 20 feet square, with stone steps on west side, with 4 steps on out side and 2 on the inside. There is a Hackberry tree standing about 10 feet south of the southeast corner wall.

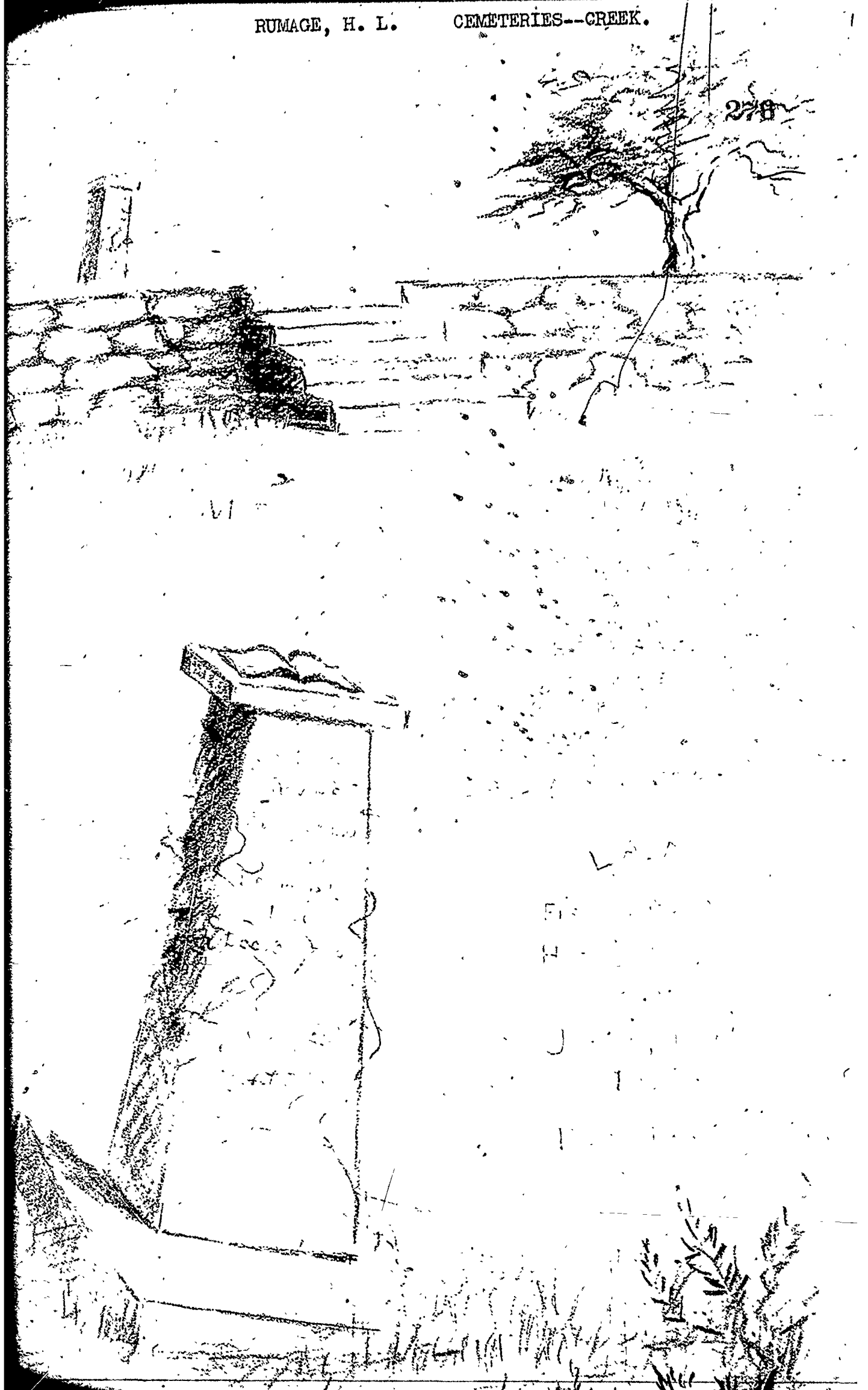
The Tombstone was made of white granite about 5 feet high, 12 inches square at top, 24 inches at the bottom.

The Tombstone is leaning to the south at an angle of about 30 degrees.

Rev. Buckner, a white man, was sent to the Creek nation as a Baptist Missionary from Kentucky. He did not preach at any one place. He went to different places. He was a great man, well liked by everyone. Rev. Buckner has a son now living at Bartlesville, Oklahoma who is a Baptist Preacher. Rev. H. F. Buckner was the Father of the Masonry in the Creek Nation, and ~~did lots of good work in that time.~~

Two or three more graves are located at the Buckner Cemetery but they have no markers.
