

Interview with Anna Faye Dismore  
Headrick, Oklahoma.

I have been living on this place about fifteen years and we had noticed that a spot down near the river is not very productive and the river bank eroded on the land so often that it looked like lawn chairs washed up on the sand.

Two years ago while plowing we uncovered a whole Indian skeleton. He pointed it to the men first and broke off a part of one bone and turned up some beads. We took the entire skeleton out. The body was in a sitting position with the knees stuck against the shoulders. There were no teeth or any bones but everything else was decayed. We left the skeleton on the ground except the skull and left for the nearest town to get a flint arrow head which the children had tried to school with them.

PLATE, ZIPIDEE N. OSA-STADICK INCEWEE EVTS SAW  
Jackson County.

There are no pounds or markings of any kind showing that the pounds are very old but I would judge there are ancient as bodies there because of the extent of the ruins in which we have found human bones.

I have been unable to find a legend of any kind about this as far as from other than history of the Indians - a village who fought many fierce battles along this river.
