BIOGRAPHY OF Ruby Love Draughon Marietta, Oklahoma

BORN

April 22, 1881 Marietta, Oklahoma (Love's Valley)

Father: Overton Love Mother: Harriet Byrd

Ruby Love Draughon is the daughter of the late Overton (500e) Love, and Harriet Byrd Love. Harreit Love was the sister of Governor Byrd, governor of the Chickasaw Nation.

Overton Love left Mississippi, during the Indian Removal, and came to Little Rock they traveled overland to the present town of Colbert, Oklahoma. Overton Love and his sister rode on the same horse.

Nout 1845 Overton Love settled in what is now known as Love's Valley, southeast of Marietta, Oklahoma on Red River. Here he became a large land holder, and owned a large number of slaves and cattle.

At one time he had about 4,000 acres of land in cultivation.

Dollie Wright one of his slaves was his nurse, and also mursed all of his children. She gave him the name of "Sobe" a name he kept all of his life, and many people never knew him by any other name. The nurse gave as her reason for calling him by the name of "Sobe" the fact that he always looked so sober.

Love took a great interest in governmental affairs of the Chickasaw Nation, and Panola and Pickens counties. He served as

judge in Picken county for a number of years, and Love county was named in his honor.

he did not get pay for, also the government bought a large amount of corn from him; for which he nevdr received pay.

The old family cemetery is located just west of the old home on Red river. It consists of approximately one hundred eighty graves, four of which were wives of Overton Love. (He has another wife buried in the cemetery at Marietta). This cemetery is now used as a hog pastur by a Mr. Askew, who occupies the old home, and many of the expensive headstones have been rooted up, and several graves destroyed by the hogs If the Denison Dam is constructed all of Love's Valley will be thrown under water. The engineer has already been talking to members of the family in regard to moving the cemetery to Marietta.


Fieldworkers Note:
