An Interview with Mrs. Lute Crane, Eufaula, Oklahoma.

"Reverend H. T. Euckner."

I knew Dr. H. T. Buckner in Texas before either of us came to the Territory; his brother, R. C. Luckner was the founder of the Luckner orphans! Home in ballss, Texas, and a professor in the Paylor University at Austin, Texas. Dr. H. F. Buckner was pastor of the First Baptist Church in Austin at the same time and a few years later he was sent to the Territory as a missionary. The Baptist Board of Missions paid all of his expenses and he was the first Baptist missionary to come to the Territory around here. (In Eufaula.)

Mr. Crame and I came to the Territory leter and the first haptist church was built here after I came to hufaula.

Dr. Buckmer was parter of this church tone time and he asked that it be called the Buckmer "emorial Church. It is called the Tirst Baptist Church" now. When Dr. Buckmer

Was first sent here as a missionary the Baptist Board of
Missions built a home for him and Mrs. Buckner and the
lumber of which the home was built was shipped from
Kentucky all ready cut and ready to be put up. Dr. Buckner
was a native of Kentucky and his home was built about two
miles east of Eufaula and was a nice country home, a twostory structure where they lived for years. This house
still stands on the hill where it was first built but
belongs to a negro man "Young Moore."

one daughter married a Mr. Grayson and they had one son,
Cecil. Mrs. Grayson died and Dr. H. F. Buckmer died in
1882 so Mrs. Buckmer had the care of this child. Later
she married Mr. Grayson, her son-in-law but he died in a
number of years. Mrs. Buckmer died later and they are all
buried on the ground near the place where the house stands.
Cecil Grayson still lives in Eufaula.
