Jack Fork County Court Ground Today.

The land on which the court house stood belongs now to Mrs. Winnie Buff, Daisy. When the property was bought by Dr. Buff, part of the building was still standing but Dr. Buff removed what was left of the building and used the lumber to build outhouses at his home which is a few hundred yards northwest of where the court house stood. Young trees have grown up all over the place where the building stood.

Just a few hundred yards north of the place where the court house stood are the five mountain springs where water was obtained. Each spring has a different mineral water. The largest and main spring that furnished water for gatherings and during court is walled with rock and is strong enough to furnish water for all the population of Daisy. The water from this spring is piped into the Buff home.

The Indian Church at Daisy, years ago, was called Many Springs. There is a small cemetery on the old court house ground and this with the rotting foundations, are all that remain of the old Jack Fork County Court House.
