My mother, Elizabeth Hosmer Norwood, was born in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, July 28, 1861, and died Dec. 28, 1928. She was the daughter of Silas and Esther Ann Hosmer.

During the Spanish-American War Mrs. Norwood was very active in the welfare of the American soldiers. She made many "House lives" and sent them to Theodore Roosevelt to be given to the needy soldier's. She has numerous letters of thanks from the soldiers and several letters from Roosevelt himself.

I have just received your very wel come gifts. One of the "House Wives" I gave to adams as you directed, the others I distributed among the other boys who seemed to need them the most.
