EDITORIAL ON ALEX POSEY

Alex Posey, the Bard of Tulledega, the writer of the famous Fus Fixico letters, has gone back to his rightful calling after four years of battling with a vulgar commercial world.

Yesterday Mr. Posey and associates purchased from George Raker, of Eufaula, the old Indian Journal, and Mr. Posey will take active charge of the editorial department at once. This is the oldest newspaper in Oklahoma, having been established in 1877. During the years of 1902 and 1903, Mr. Posey was editor of the Journal, and won fame as an Indian dialect writer. He then came to Muskogee and was employed on the old Muskogee Times, after which he went into the government service, where he remained until a little over a year ago. While in the government employ, Posey succeeded

in getting Crazy Snake to come in and take his allotment.

In addition to editing the Journal, Mr. Posey will do literary work. The press of Oklahoma will welcome him back into the fold. -- Muskogee Phoenix.
