OPOTHLEYOHOLA

"The leader of the Northern or full-blood Creeks was the venerable Opothleyohola, whose rejection of the Pike treaties afterwards precipitated civil war in the Territory. This old chief was very conservative and jealous of the encroachments of the whites. Mr. Murrow once heard him speak at one of the Indian councils, where he said: "I have always been opposed to the white man's religion, but I am not opposed to education. We must aducate our children and instill in them a love of their race so that they may stand between us and trouble." Unfortunately, trouble was to come only too soon, and the old chief himself perished during the early part of the Civil War."
