Dear Col.

Your letter of Jan 22^d we received about a week ago, but as we were expecting to have a meeting of Licking County for the purpose of taking over the matters of our people, I deferred writing till the meeting had taken place so I might have something of interest to write about.

According to notice quite a large number of the citizens came together, and a goodly number from other counties were present, all seem to feel the importance of doing something forthwith to restore law & order, United speeches were made by a number of persons on the occasion, and sundry resolutions were drafted and adopted by the meeting without a dissenting voice.

The spirit of the resolutions were that a convention ^{of the people} should be called represented by delegates, to meet on the first Wednesday in May next and to remodel the old Constitution of 1850; and the meeting also affirmed all laws passed by the Gen. Convn in pursuance of said Constitution to be in full force and virtue until superseded or repealed by legal process.

Thus we are now fairly started to form a Constitution and when it is reached

will lay aside the new Constitution; and the
true chief system will be revived. It is certain
an overwhelming majority are opposed to the
new Constitution; if the new Constitution
party persists and supported by the ~~it~~ ^{Ag} and
we are on the eve of trouble; if not we
shall soon have law & order restored which
is so desirable, and I do hope as good citi-
zens and lovers of their country ^{they will} ~~the~~ ^{per} mit
this movement to be perfected without hindern-
ance. The enterprise is set on foot on the
supposition that the new Constitution was
unconstitutionally brought about, and is
null and void; which places the old Con-
stitution party in the right & which was con-
tent ^{for} from the beginning.

This has been for nearly a whole year
a total suspension of laws throughout the
Nation and it is a matter of thankfulness
that we are no worse off than we were.

It is an evidence of the good effect
of the gospel; it was not the fear of law
which restrains our people, for then we
might expect ere now to see the whole
country in deadfull anarchy.

I believe I wrote you that Sophia F. Woods
had left with Mr L. Tolson for Edgeworth Seminary
and is there now I presume.
