Fort Smith Aug. 27<sup>th</sup> 1858

My dear Co.

I arrived at this place two weeks ago to day - since which ~~time~~ I have been confined most of my time with the "infernal Rheumatic pains" - but am glad to say to you to day that I am much better, how long I will stay so I can't tell, I need say nothing to you about the disease as you have <sup>had</sup> it so long that you understand it in all its variations - & can fully sympathize with me in my afflictions.

I should of written to you immediately on my arrival here but could <sup>not</sup> get ~~nothing~~ definite from our Camp, as the condition of the Country on & in the vicinity of the 100° W. L. until the present moment at least such news as looked upon as reliable and even the news that I have received I

look upon as being magnified  
about "fearfould" though you know  
what a number they can make of small  
matters in this part of the world. When  
they set out to do it.

The intelligence is from Mr. Jones  
at Fort Arbuckle dated 17<sup>th</sup> inst -  
at which place he had just arrived  
after completing the Creek & Seminole  
boundary - & was at the <sup>time</sup> awaiting the  
arrival of the Leans & party at the  
Fort - which <sup>he</sup> expected on the 21<sup>st</sup> inst. The  
22<sup>nd</sup> is also completed - satisfactorily  
to the commissioners. Mr. J. says in  
his letter from the best information  
he can get that there is some four  
or five thousand Comanches & Apaches,  
in the vicinity of the "Antelope Hill",  
& that the friendly Indians say they are  
hostile, & intend to make war greatly  
on the frontier, & more particularly  
on the Lexas frontier. Of this report  
I am disposed to look upon with

doubt - for this reason: - That I have  
not  
With all my acquaintance with the  
Comanche, ever known them to form  
a league with any other band of Indians  
for any purpose whatever - Secondly -  
that their numbers are over-rated -  
as they never go in so large parties or  
bands - at least I have never known  
them to do so - for you know that  
it would be impossible for them  
to subsist themselves unless they re-  
-ated to their Corrals, if they travelled  
in parties so large - & they could not  
last them long - thus the necessity  
of smaller bands - so they can subsist  
themselves on game - Mr Comanche  
don't like to kill a domesticated animal  
more than we do <sup>the</sup> he can avoid it.  
this you know without further com-  
-m-  
-out. Mr J. will be here about Sunday  
next - 29<sup>th</sup> - & then we will prepare for  
the survey of 100° <sup>say 3000</sup> It will <sup>be</sup> to that we  
will run it, or you will here of us.

having some pretty little Comanche  
fights - in attempting to do so.

I would like to hear from  
you relative to the surveys that the  
Choctaw & Chickasaw people wish done,  
as it is important us that we should  
learn at the earliest possible <sup>time</sup>. If we  
could go at it now we would draw  
of our party until we could learn  
or find out something about those Comanche  
hostilities - look into this matter - as we  
shall soon be ready to go at your  
work if you wish it done.

There is one Company of Infantry  
at Fort Arbuckle Commanded by Capt  
French - this makes the people feel  
secure in that neighbourhood - Genl  
Cooper was here a few days ago - he was  
with our party on the 98<sup>o</sup> he saw no wild  
Indians - & all that he knows of matters further  
west is ~~as~~ report such I have gave you. Jones  
writes me that he has not lost an animal, or  
seen a hostile Indian - this "big luck".  
I will write you again when Jones comes in - Hoping  
this will reach you in good health - I am very Respc'd
