The united states troops came into the Nation and found me at home and give me protection. and moved my self and nation near fort Smith where I am know. their is ^{no} doubt on the united states sid. I want to be friendly with all man. while I live on earth and die the same. they hav bin a gradle of wood cord wood chapt in the nation I suppose 3000 cords. save logs a great many the number I do not no. cattle driven out by the government and sidesent I suppose 3000 heads) Col. If I could see you I could tell you better then I can write I hope I shall see you soon then we can talk a bout old times you must excuse my bad hand writing. and language. you must
