

Fort Arbuckle Ok Jan 27, 1873

Dear Uncle

My main object in this letter  
is to get you to attend to a claim that I  
made out against the us Government in October last.  
The claim I think is good it amounts to the following  
The Commanchee Indians came down and stole  
Eighteen head of horses from me. I followed them to  
those camps where they was all in Council with  
all the Divided Indians also all the different us. agents  
was present they gave up eight head of my horses  
and I seen head I did not get. The men that taken  
the stock acknowledge to it and all at the Council  
was witness to the fact. So I went to Mr. Saturn  
those Agent at Fort Sill and made out a claim  
for the balance of my horses. for I am left  
destitute of stock to cultivate my farm  
This season. and worse than all I have not  
got the money to buy another more ~~with~~  
Uncle I wish you would attend this for  
me as soon as you can. And try and have  
it paid as soon as possible. and I will  
satisfy you for doing so. In regards  
to the old horse claims. I can get you  
up ~~seen~~ Thousand Dollars to collect if you  
think there is any chance to get it  
at ~~a~~ your own terms of charges

Mother's family is all well except Mary —  
Candy who is living very low she is  
very dangerous has been sick for a month  
Three Dos. was with her last night

Uncle Peter probably you have not yet

Bro Tom said that John's lungs

deaths in this neighborhood in the last  
Twelve months. John Pitchlynn's  
last wife was a daughter of old man  
Joseph Collett probably you was acquainted  
with him in Mississippi farther was  
well acquainted with him in Mississipi.  
They are a nice family of  
people.

by asking you write to me  
and let me know what you can  
do for me in regard to my Anna
