

Report ~~showing~~ the condition of the School Academy  
in Kentucky on 1<sup>st</sup> April 1840.

The students of this institution are generally in a ~~very~~ good healthy condition and are making as much progress in ~~learning~~ <sup>learning</sup> as at any former period — The teachers are competent, attentive and industrious paying strict attention to discipline ~~and morality~~ <sup>and order</sup>, as well as <sup>the giving of</sup> instruction in the various branches of education.

The supplies of books and other stationery, clothing, provisions and medical attendance together with every thing necessary for the comfort and convenience of the students are ample and abundantly sufficient — The diets suitably varied for the promotion of health.

The ~~young men~~ students are generally well behaved and peaceable, and ~~well~~ <sup>friendly</sup> disposed among the sexes ~~and elsewhere~~. consequently we have had but little trouble during the past quarter with unruly and disobedient boys.

As to the cases of sickness during the past quarter, and the few cases on the sick list at this time as well as the one death will all be shown

in the report of Dr. Evans herewith the attending  
physician for the school.
