New River. March 30. 1847.

Dear Guy

I sent up on the Elk on last Sunday (day before yesterday) 144 Emigrants - have with me now 6 others, making in all of my party 150 -

I stayed behind to gather up others - but my health has failed, and I am compelled to leave the field with fair prospects of getting more behind -

I regret it very much.

I shall take the 1st boat that comes along, and join my party as soon as possible.

I was attacked with the Cholera Morbus about a week ago - and have had some fevers, ~~and~~ a dysentery, which together has reduced my strength very much -

If my health would permit I would like to come & make a clean sweep of the River Coast & the Lake shores of all the Indians - which I think could be done in a very little time.

~~I am very busy~~

Believing your name gone down
to aid Major Hunt with his party
I send this to New Orleans that you
may know the extent of our operations.

This small, till true, but who has done
better? I am with Respectfully.

P.S. I have told the Indians that
the talk now from the Beloved
Man, is that the Indians must
go - for he has waited upon them
to go of their own accord, till
his patience is worn out - now
he has determined to take them to
their country any how - this
kind of talk has done more
good than all the persuasions
I have ever been able to make.
Sustain this, in all your talks
to the Indians, for I may return
