Sept 23rd. - 20 feet deep, 0°

After being confined to my bed for four days with the hot burning fevers, I am now, comfortable, and hope in a few days to regain my usual health. The rest of my family are all well.

I received 2 letters from you some time ago, one from the day it seemed "impossible to have been written in another house yesterdays, and more than likely you had just cause to do"

I have experienced a lot of trouble lately, and it is one cause why I am a long ways from home after my people. I am here among strangers and don't know and have nothing, today, if I have I do not know of it. Since our busy quiet life those past 6 months, there was a little excitement up not long since nothing but a big Bull play soon over, followed by the passing levinty one of the 1st. District, and one from Bushie Playa against Blue and Pecos County

Bro. you sayed that you thought
of getting you a wife this winter
and that you would have more
and give me an invitation
as soon as I get the in with S.
twice by ^{and} them, and pasture of
the fine Baiman, and every other
thing that may be laying before
me. I wish you all the success in
the world, and would not care
how soon to hear the news
I pity every man that is trying
to keep house without a wife
when I ^{was} down sick and not
a soul to wait on me but
a negro. Then I would have
given any thing in the world
to have a good loving wife
to have me a good clean and
cool drink of water
and to talk and sing
the number I was in
such a work of misery.

so it was half Choctaws and half Chickasaws
They were mixed up, tho on one side
all Choctaws except 4. My side all Chicka-
saws, the way the poor Choctaws did
git kick out, was not slow, I suppose
if all the hair that was pulled out and
those being gathered there was enough
to form a sandal. Mortin and Jack
players, and am told that they left
a fine lot of hair on the ground
the great bully they call teas, got off fully
use up Jack, a roundabout, down in him
and took him by the hair and slap
string and would stand him up and
beat his face and belly against the
ground, and the way he did hit
I swear was not slow. ~~I am told that~~ it
is thought that they will have another
play but it will be against the Choctaws
as soon as the Chickasaw Council
is over, which will take place
on Monday next, I shud try and
attend the Council, and do all I
can for your Society, I now return
to visit it but without giving to the
my last Yes again and others tell me
that it will pass this Council.

I do not know what the Cholans
will do for it. It is summered
up here that Jones and J. McHenry
are opposed to it. I saw your friend
E. Perkins not long since he is rare
and never forgets to ask about you.
I have not heard from mother since
she started for home. She would have
enjoyed herself but as usual with
her she has one of her fits or in goutous
with her. The goat got sick and
Pisson Victor a poor blind fellow
was a long time but got sick so she
had to be a servant for them. I was
very much to see them a long time ago
but to witness her poor old frame as
now. I am now getting my corn
and it turns out like "small potatoes"
in digging time I will have enough
to do me and perhaps a few hundred
bushels to sell. I do not think that
I will raise the potatoe seed I
planted, tho we have a fine rain
some time since, for the last ten
days the Army men made their appear-
ance, and has swept every thing
before them there is no grass nor wood

Kee dank.

I think I mentioned in my last letter
that I have been making some
towards a ~~list~~, well I got a list
the other day whilst I was in
which still ~~lives~~ in it. I will be
so busy now - to your prop.
and am unable to share your
sorrows, and troubles, and will
endeavor - to try and make you
happy things - life, and will
conform to all the regulations
and rules that a wife may have
to do, and has left the time for
me to appoint.

from you. If you will come, you
shall see your Bro stand up on the
floor and take him a sit, I had
some I did to keep it off until

be there some time, and that it
