Dear Col — March 18th 1856

Your note giving notice of the ratification of the Treaty has come to hand - I am glad the treaty passed without any amendments - I hope the Senators will agree to give us the Nett proceeds and thereby enable us to pay off our people, who have had claims of long standing against the United States - I am glad to hear the course that you pursued towards Jackson -

He had come to make or spoil - curse his liver - Now Peter it is very important that Gen Cooper should be retained in office - he knows all about the different arrangements of this treaty - he will do the delegation justice - I heard that Isreal had promised a certain white man in case the treaty was ratified to use his influence to get him appointed - this is wrong. Cooper has proved himself to be a friend to the Choctaws.

the delegation should be the last
men to throw him off - Endeavor
to keep him in until a new ad-
ministration comes in - I am sorry
the Commissioner of Indian Affairs
has not thought proper to let him
come on to Washington - I think
our Agent should be permitted to
assist us in settling up our affairs
with the Government - I shall
address a letter to the Commissioner
on the subject - I wrote you by

Mr S. Hulson, giving an account
of a conversation between myself
and Mr Murray of Clarksville, Tenn
about the Chief Justice Council
empowering Sampson to draw
one hundred and fifty thousand
to pay her contracts - The object
was to draw the money at Wash-
ington - I hope you will make
him stand up to his contract
for Sampson never had it not
been for the influence of certain
Christians the Treaty never would have
passed - Do all you can for me
my whole dependance is in you -
Try and have the ballance of

us get our percentage and be
done with it — Give it all up
before you come home — How glad
I would be to get a letter from
you that Sampson had jerked
over that money — All peace
and harmony in my district —
We have a cold backward
Spring — Write often —
