June 5th

I am going to write you a few lines in answer to yours of May 26/55 which was rec'd by last mail. I have no news worth writing. Things very quiet and dull, prospects bad for farmers the weather is very dry.

I saw Capt Kincaid this morning he has met with a very melancholy loss his wife was taken sick tonight before last about mid night and died before day we have just got through billing her. Capt Kincaid's says his promise to you is that as soon as he gets back home he will write to you. We have no called Council as yet. it is talked of I cant say wheather we will have a call Council or not. I am very much gratified to hear that you are in such good hopes of doing something for the Nation. Should you get the met proceeds of the old Country, there is a portion of Country there that ought to be looked after, that is the Country that lies along ~~the~~ on the bay from mobile to

New Orleans by examining old
Treaties you may find something about
it there is nothing in any of the
Treaties with the U.S. ^{that I can see} what the Choctaws
sold it to the U.S. look at the Treaties
with Spain and the Choctaws and all
the ^{old} Treaties ^{about} that Country I supposed
it belonged to the Choctaws in old
times and if there is no man
what they conveyed it a way they
must of course be entitled to
something for it. It is worth making
a search for. I may be mistaken
tho I use use to hear my Father talk
about this matter and say he thought
the Choctaws had never sold
that part of their Territory.

I must stop as the mail is near
at hand. We are all well. at
this time I have not seen Col. ~~St~~
for some weeks. he is well
I heard from him not long since
and he was well. I am yours truly
